A Message From Mayor Shapiro



Together, we will continue to build on our successes in 2026

Reflecting on 2025, I am proud of what we accomplished together and am excited about the year ahead. We strengthened core services, repaved Hazel Avenue to improve safety and reliability, launched a new municipal adjudication system to handle citations more efficiently, and continued to focus on responsive, transparent service at Village Hall.

In addition, several residential projects are under construction that will add more than 600 new homes across a range of options and price points. Lake Cook Crossings at Deerbrook Mall will offer a 254 unit rental community with a pedestrian path to the Metra station and will include 25 affordable units. Pulte's Leclair Estates is transforming 18 acres of the Wilmot Road Walgreens campus into 42 single family homes, with homebuilding already in progress. At 5 and 8 Parkway North, 144 rental townhomes, including 14 affordable units, are going vertical. In addition, the Deerfield Supportive Living Facility at 1101 1121 Lake Cook Road is nearing completion, delivering a four story building with 147 affordable units for seniors.

Our finances remain very strong. Looking ahead, the Village Board has approved a \$62.7 million budget for 2026 that invests \$8.03 million in capital infrastructure to maintain streets, utilities and facilities, with the average homeowner paying \$70 more in property taxes. We are proud to maintain our Aaa bond rating and remain committed to careful stewardship of taxpayer dollars.

We also advanced our climate goals. This year, we completed a ground mounted 574 kilowatt solar array behind the Water Reclamation Facility, a key step toward the Climate Action Report targets adopted in 2022: reducing emissions 45% by 2030, converting 100% of electricity to renewable sources by 2030, and reaching carbon neutrality by 2050. The new system is expected to supply about 20% of the facility's annual electricity with clean power. The total project cost was \$2,248,297, with a net cost after incentives of \$642,306, resulting in an estimated 11 year payback and a projected 20 year net positive cash flow of \$1,101,678. In addition to the 20% solar supply at the WRF, we implemented Community Solar at the WRF that allows the Village to support renewable energy without installing additional solar panels and generates savings of approximately \$28,000 per year.

Interest in the Lake Cook Road and Downtown tax increment financing districts is strong as we work to bring new commercial businesses and amenities to Deerfield.

Public Works Updates

SNOW PLOWING BY THE NUMBERS

70 lane miles of roadway to clear per snow event

2,500 tons of road salt used per year

14 plow routes to clear per snow event

25 miles of sidewalk to clear per snow event near schools

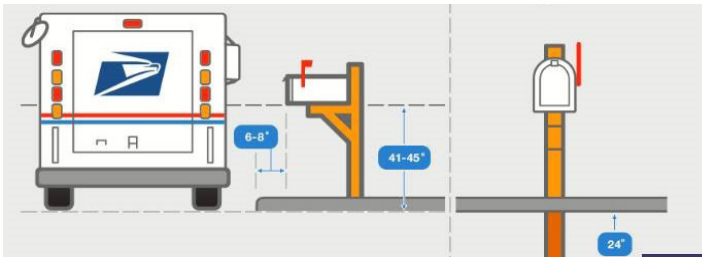
Village Snow Plowing Operations

The Village's Public Works Department is prepared for snow and is able to effectively clear Deerfield's 70 miles of roadway quickly to make safe travel possible for all who use our streets.

Keeping vehicles off the street assists plows and salt trucks in clearing the streets more effectively. As a reminder, vehicles cannot be parked on the street for 24 hours after two inches of snow have fallen, per Village ordinance.

By Village ordinance, you may not deposit snow from your property onto the street or sidewalk. This can hinder safe passage of vehicles and pedestrians and make it harder for Village plow crews to keep streets clear.

Please remember to shovel an extra area on your driveway apron or parkway to properly stage your refuse, recycling and compost bins for pick-up by Lakeshore Recycling.



Prevent Damage to Mailboxes

Mailboxes are sometimes damaged when snow storms affect Deerfield. If your mailbox is damaged or if you are planning to install a new one, please consult the guidelines on how to properly install a mailbox in a way that meets postal standards.

The majority of mailbox knockdowns occur because the post supporting the mailbox has deteriorated or the mailbox was installed incorrectly. (See graphic to the left.)

Per the United States Postal Service installation requirements, mailboxes should be positioned 41 to 45 inches from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox and six to eight inches back from the curb. The post should be strong, but should be able to break away if struck by a vehicle that leaves the pavement.

If you decide to install a new mailbox, contact JULIE by dialing 811 before you dig. This will allow you to identify where buried utilities are located.



Winter Tree Trimming

The Village's Public Works Department is responsible for trimming parkway trees for traffic clearance, to preserve the trees' health and appearance, and to prevent possible damage to human life and property. The Village has established a cycle for the parkway tree trimming program. Deerfield is divided into quadrants with Deerfield Road as the north/south divider and Waukegan Road as the east/west divider. This year's trimming will take place in the southwest and southeast quadrants.

Trimming work is scheduled during the dormant season to avoid unnecessary damage or trauma to the tree.

Trimming is done in accordance with professional standards and may include cutting lower limbs for clearance and thinning of the crown.



Hazel Avenue Construction

The 2025 Hazel Avenue Reconstruction Project, which began design in 2020, includes a complete water main replacement, full roadway reconstruction, and sidewalk improvements along Hazel Avenue between Waukegan Road and Wilmot Road. Designed to meet federal funding requirements, the project was awarded nearly \$5 million in federal funding in 2023.

Construction began in early March and was substantially completed in 2025. However, some items such as parkway

restoration, final paving between Wayne Avenue and Chestnut Street and tree plantings are scheduled to take place in the spring once weather permits.

New Laws for 2026

Safe Gun Storage Act

Public Act 104-0031 creates the Safe Gun Storage Act. Gun owners must store their firearms safely if they know or should know that a minor, at-risk person or someone who is not allowed to have a gun could access them. Unsafe storage can result in fines from \$500 to \$10,000, depending on what happens as a result. Exceptions apply when the gun is lawfully carried, or under the owner's control. The bill also makes other changes regarding reporting lost or stolen guns and gun dealer responsibilities.

Missing Persons Identification Act

Public Act 104-0339 ends waiting periods for filing missing person reports. Police must take reports right away and cannot refuse to take a report because of the person's age, mental health, possible foul play, where they went missing or because they may have left on their own. Police also cannot refuse to take a report because the person making it does not have all the information or is not a family member of the missing person.

Victim Rights

Public Act 104-0173 provides that law enforcement officers cannot discourage or try to stop a victim from filing a police report about abuse, sexual assault, sexual abuse, neglect or exploitation. It also clarifies victims' rights to receive timely notice of court hearings, requiring that victims get notice at least seven days before most court proceedings.

New Technology in the Deerfield Communications Center

The Deerfield Communications Dispatch Center recently implemented indoor mapping for all 18 schools within our jurisdiction, significantly enhancing emergency response capabilities. This major accomplishment was made possible through a \$151,000 grant award, which funded the expansion of indoor mapping technology. The project provided dispatchers and first responders with detailed, room-by-room layouts of each school, allowing for faster navigation and improved coordination during critical incidents such as medical emergencies, active threats or evacuations. The initiative represents a major advancement in public safety technology, strengthening situational awareness and improving the overall efficiency and safety of our



multi-agency response operations.

In November 2025, the Deerfield Communications Dispatch Center purchased the Carbyne APEX Next Generation 9-1-1 call-taking system. This state-of-the-art platform enhances the center's capabilities with real-time language translation, live video streaming and text-to-911 features, providing dispatchers with greater situational awareness and improved response efficiency. The integration of Carbyne APEX represents a major milestone in advancing the center's technology infrastructure and ensures that Deerfield Communications remains fully equipped for ongoing Next Generation 9-1-1 operations, meeting the evolving needs of the community and first responders. It is anticipated to go live and fully implement all of Carbyne's features in March 2026.

National SRO Appreciation Day

February 15, 2026, marks National School Resource Officer Appreciation Day, a special occasion to honor the outstanding work of our School Resource Officers, Officer Lauren Maldonado and Officer McKenzie Cherestal. Officer Maldonado serves the Deerfield Public Schools District 109, and Officer Cherestal is stationed at Deerfield High School. These officers are critical in contributing to the safety, well-being, and positive growth of our students.

School Resource Officers are more than just law enforcement officers posted in a school; they are mentors, role models and trusted individuals who play a pivotal role in creating safe and supportive school environments. Their presence helps foster a sense of security and assurance among students, staff, and families.

Officers Maldonado and Cherestal consistently demonstrate dedication, going above and beyond to build meaningful relationships with our youth. Their hard work and unwavering commitment truly make a lasting and significant impact.



THE GREEN LINE

As temperatures drop, a few simple habits can keep your home comfortable while trimming utility costs. Set your thermostat to 68 degrees when you're home, then lower it 7 to 10 degrees while you sleep or are away. A programmable or smart thermostat can handle the schedule automatically and may qualify for rebates through ComEd.

Keep your furnace running efficiently by replacing filters every one to three months and scheduling a yearly tuneup to check combustion, airflow and safety controls. Small fixes can make a big difference: Seal drafts around windows, doors and attic hatches with caulk or weatherstripping, and add door sweeps where needed.

Make the most of winter sun by opening south-facing curtains during the day and closing window coverings at night to reduce heat loss. Set water heaters to 120 degrees for comfort and savings. If you use a space heater, operate it sparingly, keep a 3-foot clearance and plug it directly into a wall outlet. Test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms monthly. Income-qualified residents may find help through LIHEAP or the Illinois Home Weatherization Assistance Program.



District 109 Referendum

At the December 18 meeting, the District 109 Board of Education voted to place an \$87,782,857 referendum on the March 17, 2026, ballot. The revised proposal increases the District's financial contribution and reduces the project scope, resulting in a 33% reduction in the estimated tax impact (from \$536 per \$10,000 tax bill to \$359 per \$10,000 tax bill annually over the life of the 25-year bonds). More than 60% of project costs would be funded by District resources. The updated plan continues to address critical infrastructure, accessibility,

safety and security needs, as well as improvements to learning environments in every school.
